Episode 20: Andreas Nachama, Sally Azar, Ufuk Topkara: Jerusalem in Judaism, Christianity and Islam

Rabbi Prof. Dr. Andreas Nachama is a renowned historian, author, and rabbi and the former director of the Topography of Terror Foundation in Berlin, former chairman of the Jewish Community of Berlin and former Board member of the Central Council of Jews in Germany. The son of a Holocaust survivor was the head of the General Rabbinical Conference in Germany from 2019-2023 and President and since 2016 he has served as the Jewish Chair of Germany's Coordination Council for Christian-Jewish Societies (GCJZ). He is the Cofounder of the House of One, the first shared house of prayer and learning for Jews, Christians and Muslims in the World. He was awarded the Moses Mendelssohn Medal in 2019.

Pastor Sally Azar is a Palestinian Christian who was born in Jerusalem. She is the first female Palestinian pastor in the Holy Land, serving the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. She leads the English- and Arabic-speaking congregation at the Church of the Redeemer in Jerusalem and is engaged in interreligious dialogue. She is a member of the Council of the Lutheran World Federation and the Board of the ACT Alliance.

Prof. Dr. Ufuk Topkara is a Junior Professor of Comparative Theology at the Berlin Institute for Islamic Theology, Humboldt University. He studied History and Philosophy at the Humboldt University Berlin and in Harvard. He is a postdoctoral researcher in the Humility & Conviction in Public Life Program at the University of Connecticut and Fellow at the Virginia Center for the Study of Religion, University of Virginia. He was a former visiting scholar at UCLA and at the American Institute for Contemporary German Studies at Johns Hopkins University.

In this episode: In this episode, we take an in-depth look at Jerusalem, a city of profound religious, historical, and political significance for Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. Our guests discuss the city's sacred origins, its depiction in religious texts, and how its meaning has evolved through centuries of conquest, diaspora, and pilgrimage. The conversation also explores Jerusalem's contemporary role in Jewish, Christian, and Muslim communities, including eschatological visions and opportunities for interfaith dialogue. Through personal reflections, the guests share how Jerusalem shapes faith, identity, and approaches to conflict resolution. Listeners will gain a nuanced understanding of the city from multiple religious perspectives and discover how it can be a place of connection, dialogue, and hope rather than division.
