Episode 27: Volker Weiss, Author and Historian

Guest: Dr. Volker Weiß – Historian, author

Bio: Dr. Volker Weiß is a historian, independent journalist, and leading analyst on authoritarian and far-right movements in Germany and beyond. He studied literature, social and economic history, and psychology at the University of Hamburg and has taught at the Universities of Hamburg, Leipzig, and Munich. In 2021, he held a guest professorship at the Institute for Contemporary History at the University of Innsbruck. Weiß regularly contributes to major media outlets, including *Die Zeit*, *taz*, and *Süddeutsche Zeitung*. His 2017 book, *Die autoritäre Revolte. Die Neue Rechte und der Untergang des Abendlandes (The Authoritarian Revolt: The New Right and the Decline of the West*), was nominated for the Leipzig Book Fair Prize, and his latest work, *Das Deutsche Demokratische Reich. Wie die extreme Rechte Geschichte und Demokratie zerstört* (2025) (*The German Democratic Reich: How the Extreme Right Destroys History and Democracy*), immediately reached number one on German nonfiction bestseller lists. His research examines contemporary authoritarian tendencies in the context of historical continuities and ideological structures.

In this episode: Efe and Philip talk with Dr. Weiß about the current dynamics of the Israel-Palestine conflict, situating it within global trends of authoritarianism, and the so-called "authoritarian revolt." Dr. Weiß explains key concepts such as metapolitics and cultural hegemony and traces historical continuities that link extremist movements across time and geography. The conversation explores how far-right and authoritarian ideologies intersect with contemporary debates around Israel, antisemitism, and the recent escalation in Gaza since October 7. Dr. Weiß provides insight into ideological parallels between far-right movements in Germany, Europe, the US, and the Middle East, examining how historical alliances, nationalist ideologies, and extremist strategies shape modern political conflicts. The discussion also critically addresses media polarization, political instrumentalization of antisemitism, and the motives behind the Hamas attacks, offering nuanced perspectives on both historical context and present-day developments.
