Episode 28: Benjamin Fischer

Guest: Benjamin Fischer – Founding President of the German Jewish Student Union, Former President of the European Union of Jewish Students, European Consultant for Digital and Minority Rights

Hosts: Efe & Philip

Bio: Benjamin Fischer is a European advisor on digital and minority rights, focusing on combating online hate and strengthening civil society organizations through data- and innovation-driven activism. As Program Director of the Alfred Landecker Foundation, he has led initiatives supporting these goals. Fischer serves as Chairman of the Advisory Board at CeMAS (Center for Monitoring, Analysis, and Strategy) and sits on several other curatorial boards. He was the founding president of the Jewish Student Union Germany, president of the European Union of Jewish Students, and a member of the Executive Committee of the World Jewish Congress, representing over 160,000 Jewish students from more than 35 countries before bodies including the United Nations, the European Parliament, and the Knesset. His work has focused on coalition-building with other minority communities, including Romnja, Armenian, and Jewish-Muslim dialogue initiatives.

In this episode: Efe and Philip speak with Benjamin Fischer about the personal and communal impact of the October 7 attacks. The discussion explores how these events affected Jewish communities in Israel and Germany, the rise in antisemitism, and the challenges faced by students and civil society in politically polarized contexts. In conversation, Fischer shares about his family's North African roots and the history of Jewish expulsions from the region -. an too often overlooked story that resonates with the broader experience of Mizrahi Jews, who today make up roughly half of Israel's Jewish population. He reflects on his experience leading Jewish student organizations and his work in minority alliances, that are unfortunately eroding since October 7. He is emphasizing the importance of digital activism against hate speech on platforms like TikTok and discusses strategies for combating online antisemitism, the broader implications of extremist content, and the need for education that frames Jewish identity beyond the Holocaust or Israel. The conversation concludes with Fischer's reflections on hope and shares three political wishes for a path forward in a fraught global landscape.
