## **Episode 31: Omri Boehm**

**Guest:** Prof. Dr. Omri Boehm, Associate Professor of Philosophy, The New School for Social Research (New York)

**Bio:** Omri Boehm is a philosopher and public intellectual whose work explores the intersections of politics, ethics, and universalism. Born in Israel, he studied philosophy at Tel Aviv University before earning his PhD at Yale. He is now Associate Professor of Philosophy at the New School for Social Research in New York and has become one of the most influential voices in debates on Israel/ Palestine, identity politics, and the future of democracy. His most notable books include *Haifa Republic - A Democratic Future for Israel (Israel – eine Utopie)* and *Radical Universalism: Beyond Identity (Radikaler Universalismus. Jenseits von Identität)*, which won the 2024 Leipzig Book Award for European Understanding. Known for bringing a rare clarity in dissecting complex issues while resisting wrong alternatives and the reductionist thinking so often found around the Middle East conflict, even among intellectuals, Boehm discusses his vision of coexistence and peace in the region, particularly in light of the horrific events of October 7 and the war in Gaza.

In this Episode: Recorded on Friday, March 21, 2025, hosts Efe and Yusuf sit down with Prof. Omri Boehm to discuss his philosophical and political reflections on Israel/Palestine and the broader global context. The conversation begins with the Gaza war and the collapse of the ceasefire, with Boehm expressing concern over the deepening humanitarian crisis and the global risks of escalating violence. They then explore the wave of student protests on US campuses - the largest since the Vietnam War - and Boehm explains how these movements relate to his critique of identity politics. Drawing from Radical Universalism, he challenges postcolonial frameworks that portray Israel solely as a settler-colonial state and highlights their limitations in understanding the conflict. Boehm also addresses genocide accusations from human rights organizations and recent international legal actions, including arrest warrants from the International Criminal Court and the International Court of Justice's acceptance of South Africa's genocide case. He sharply distinguishes between legitimate legal proceedings and political campaigns aimed at delegitimizing Israel, reflecting on how free speech and democratic values are being tested in Germany, the US, and beyond. In the final section, Boehm presents his vision of an Israeli-Palestinian federation - the "Republic of Haifa" - as an alternative to the two-state solution. Drawing on Kant, he emphasizes friendship as an ethical guide in times of catastrophe, and the episode closes with his advice for young people seeking peace and justice and a one-sentence vision for the region's future.
