# **Episode 42: The Long Shadow of the Perpetrators**

**Guest:** Alexandra Senfft — German author, journalist, and researcher; first grandchild of a Nazi perpetrator in Germany to publicly confront and expose her family legacy.

Hosts: Efe & Philip

Bio: Alexandra Senfft is a German publicist, Middle East expert, and political author. She studied Islamic studies and worked as a non-partisan Middle East adviser for the Green Party in the German Bundestag. She later served as an UNRWA observer in the West Bank and as UNRWA spokesperson in Gaza until 1991. Senfft has worked extensively in Israel as a journalist and expert, and served for five years on the board of the German-Israeli Working Group for Peace in the Middle East (DiAk). She also closely collaborated with the great Israeli psychologist Dan Bar-On in the dialog training program *Storytelling in* Conflict, learning the biographical approach to conflict resolution. He was the first to bring descendants of victims and perpetrators of the Holocaust into dialogue, a work that he later continued with Israelis and Palestinians. Her most notable books include: Silence hurts. A German Family history (Schweigen tut weh. Eine deutsche Familiengeschichte) that was awarded the German Biography Prize in 2008, Between Antisemitism and Islamophobia (Zwischen Antisemitismus und Islamophobie, 2008), The Long Shadow of the Perpetrator (Der Lange Schatten der Täter. Nachkommen stellen sich ihrer NS-Familiengeschcihte, 2016) and Great Uncle Paul's Violin Bow. The Family History of a Prussian Sinti, 2024). She is also 2nd chair of the working group for intergenerational effects of the Holocaust and board member of the memorial site of the concentration camp of Dachau and the *Parents Circle - Families Forum Germany*, which brings together grieving Israeli and Palestinian families in the spirit of reconciliation.

In this Episode: Efe and Philip speak with Alexandra Senfft about the long shadow of the Nazi era on subsequent generations in Germany and how intergenerational trauma persists. Senfft reflects on being the first grandchild of a Nazi perpetrator to publicly confront her family's history, exposing the silence and denial that often shape families of perpetrators. The conversation explores the effects of familial silence, how responsibility is perceived today, and the societal and political implications of unaddressed historical trauma. Senfft discusses her work with the Holocaust intergenerational studies group, her time in Gaza as UNRWA spokesperson, and lessons learned from working with Dan Bar-On on dialogue-based conflict resolution. She also shares her perspective on Germany's approach to memory and responsibility, the role of schools in fostering inclusive remembrance, and how dialogue between Germans, Israelis, and Palestinians can help untangle the complex trauma binding these communities.
