Episode 47: Evaluating Education on the Israel/Palestine Conflict

Guest: Per Leo, Historian, Author, Journalist

Hosts: Philip & Efe

Bio: Per Leo studied history, philosophy, and Slavic studies in Freiburg and Berlin, earning his PhD in 2009 at Humboldt University. His novel *Flut und Boden*, which reflects on his grandfather Friedrich Leo, an SS-Sturmbannführer, and the family's history during the Nazi era, was shortlisted for the 2014 Leipzig Book Fair Prize and received several awards. Since 2021, Leo has critically examined German culture of remembrance in the context of the Middle East conflict and migration, notably in his essay *Tränen ohne Trauer*. He writes for leading publications including *Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung*, *Süddeutsche Zeitung*, *Die Zeit*, *Die Welt*, and *Neue Rundschau*, and lives in Berlin with his family as a freelance author. He is a 2024/2025 fellow at the Institute for Advanced Study in Berlin (Wissenschaftskolleg Berlin) where he examines how schools deal with the Israel/Palestine conflict.

In this episode: In this episode, Efe and Philip speak with Dr. Per Leo about how the Israel-Palestine conflict is addressed in Berlin schools. Drawing on his research and conversations with teachers, parents, and students, Leo explores how the conflict is taught historically, politically, and ethically. The discussion highlights the challenges of presenting multiple perspectives and making existing controversies visible - consistent with the requirements of the Beutelsbach Consensus for civic education - rather than promoting a single narrative or reducing the territorial conflict solely to issues of antisemitism. Topics include the role of inclusive remembrance culture in Germany, approaches to antisemitism, and Germany's special responsibility toward Israel. Leo also explains how historical events and political conflicts can be taught in ways that are ethically meaningful for students. The episode concludes with practical guidance and reflective questions for teachers on how to engage thoughtfully and responsibly with the Israel-Palestine conflict in the classroom.

For her scholarly achievements as a historian, she was awarded the *Preis des Historischen Kollegs* in 2025, the highest distinction in her discipline in Germany.
