## Episode 5: Alex de Waal, The Starvation of Gaza

**Guest:** Prof. Dr. Alex de Waal, Executive Director, World Peace Foundation, Fletcher School of Global Affairs, Tufts University

**Bio:** Professor Alex de Waal is a world-leading authority on famine, mass atrocities, and the intersection of humanitarian crises and international law. He serves as Executive Director of the World Peace Foundation at Tufts University's Fletcher School of Global Affairs and has conducted extensive field research in Sudan, Ethiopia, Syria, and other regions affected by conflict and starvation. He is the author of the landmark book *Mass Starvation: The History and Future of Famine*, which has shaped global understanding of how famine is both produced and prevented. His work combines academic rigor, field expertise, and legal insight, particularly regarding the use of starvation as a weapon of war. He has published numerous books and articles on famine, human rights, and conflict prevention, making him one of the foremost voices for understanding and preventing mass atrocities worldwide.

In this episode: In this emergency chapter of the podcast, Professor de Waal explains the unfolding starvation of Gaza. He discusses why the current famine is both extreme and man-made, breaking down the mechanisms—military, bureaucratic, and logistical—that are contributing to mass starvation. He situates the crisis within the framework of international law, explaining the legal implications of starvation as a weapon and the responsibilities of all parties, including Germany and international civil society. The episode also addresses reports of hostages being denied food and medical care, the verification of humanitarian data in a highly polarized context, and what immediate actions are required to prevent further deaths. Finally, Alex de Waal speaks directly to young people and civil society about the role they can play in responding to this urgent crisis.
